Seminar: FBI Next Generation Identification System

Description: Beginning in July 1999, the CJIS Division operated and maintained the IAFIS, the world's largest person-centric database. The IAFIS provided automated tenprint and latent fingerprint searches, electronic image storage, electronic exchanges of fingerprints and responses, as well as text-based searches based on descriptive information. Because of growing threats, new identification capabilities were necessary. Advancements in technology allowed further development of biometric identification services. The CJIS Division, with guidance from the user community, developed the NGI System to meet the evolving business needs of its IAFIS customers. Building on the foundation of the IAFIS, the NGI brought the FBI's biometric identification services and criminal history information to the next level. The NGI system improved the efficiency and accuracy of biometric services to address evolving local, state, tribal, federal, national, and international criminal justice requirements. New capabilities include a national Rap Back service; the Interstate Photo System; text-based searches for images of scars, marks, and tattoos; fingerprint verification services; more complete and accurate identity records; and enhancements to the biometric identification repository. In September 2014, the CJIS Division launched the final phase of NGI services, thus replacing the remaining IAFIS functionality.

AMOC also coordinates operations with North American Aerospace Defense Command (NORAD) and the governments of Mexico, Canada and the Bahamas. Utilizing sophisticated technology, AMOC detects, identifies, tracks and coordinates the interdiction of suspect aviation and maritime threats at the national and international levels.

Description: The negative climate of change surrounding the field of law enforcement today can cause a tremendous amount of work-related and family stress, which can be a serious threat to the well-being of our law enforcement personnel. Having a Peer Support program in place not only helps decrease day-to-day stress, it can also countercheck the emotional strain of critical incidents and prevent the accumulation of emotions that can lead to alcohol abuse, depression, domestic violence, and suicide. Benefits of a developing a Peer Support program include the ability to provide peers with immediate assistance, provide additional support, allow for ventilation and sharing to take place, and works in tandem with the services provided by chaplains and mental health professionals. A successful Peer Support program reduces long-term critical incident stress, turn-over and health insurance costs, worker's compensation claims, fitness-for-duty evaluations and supports supervisor referrals.

Seminar: *Critical Incident Stress, Vicarious Traumatization (VT), and Post Trauma Stress Reactions in the Law Enforcement Professional – A Resiliency Initiative*

Description: This seminar encompasses an in-depth discussion surrounding critical incident stress (acute stress reactions), Vicarious Trauma, and post trauma stress reactions (chronic). Emphasis is placed upon how such symptoms can affect law enforcement professionals and their families. The attendee will be able to identify what a critical incident is, the stress that results from such (acute stress reactions), what the indices of Vicarious Traumatization (VT) are the key differences from critical incident stress vs. chronic post trauma stress reactions, and how each can disturb our normal way of life, our beliefs and the very fabric and foundation of existence before such trauma. The attendee will be informed about the key difference between VT and Post Trauma Stress (PTS), interventions surrounding the anxiety based symptom(s) recovery process, stages of grief, trauma specifically surrounding gun violence, and the benefits of relaxation.

Public Safety Professionals' (PSP) will be able to identify and potentially manage critical incident stress, VT, and chronic post trauma stress reactions. VT is a concept that was designed to provide a framework for understanding the negative effects of exposure to trauma on crisis workers, first responders, police officers, and public safety personnel whom work within the domain of trauma exposure. The attendee will learn the differences between defusing and critical incident stress debriefings and the importance for such support. Upon completion, the attendee will be able to potentially acquire, change, and utilize prevention and intervention skills (via CBT-reframing skills), targeting the array of trauma-based psychological, physiological, and behavioral reactions.

Seminar: From the Street to the Jail: How to Calmly Interact with the Bad and the Sad

Description: Momentary lack of emotional control; impulsive reactions followed by later regret – experiences that are common to all people. For police and correctional officers alike, confronting individuals with severe character issues and exhibiting little self-control become the ingredients to potentially life-threatening situations. When the stakes are high and emotions are strong, staff may understandably struggle to communicate effectively and maintain their composure. Their best efforts may inadvertently produce greater hostility or violence from arrestees, resulting in significant liability issues. Overcoming the emotional strangle that occurs when the brain is hijacked by fight-or-flight reflexes is essential for the restoration of safe and

productive dialogues. Attendees of this workshop will review disruptive yet predictable behavioral patterns of arrestees, examine the physiology of fight-or-flight reactions, practice the elements of speaking persuasively and calmly when under duress, and apply sensible de-escalation strategies for safe and effective exchanges with unstable individuals. Taking information beyond theory, this workshop is designed to provide practical and well-defined diffusion and negotiation techniques, ensuring attendees leave with clear recipes for success.
